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In submitting an abstract for consideration for an ISSCR meeting, authors are responsible for ensuring that work described in the abstract is conducted in accordance with the following rules and policies. Failure to comply with these terms constitutes grounds for abstract rejection. All submitted abstracts are evaluated by the Program/Organizing Committee to ensure that they meet submission standards:

- Substantive results, whether experimental, calculated or theoretical, must be included.
- Clinical case studies will not be considered.
- Abstracts of commercial products must include experimentally derived, quantitative data.

On occasion, the Program/Organizing Committee may solicit additional information from submitters to ensure that the work reported in an abstract complies with the ISSCR Research Conduct Policy. Failure to reply satisfactorily to a request for additional information constitutes grounds for abstract rejection.

While abstracts are evaluated for scientific interest and are citable, the brevity of the presentation precludes rigorous peer review. Thus, abstract acceptance by the ISSCR should not be taken as endorsement of the validity or safety of research by the ISSCR.

1. ISSCR Research Conduct Policy

Submission of an abstract constitutes a formal agreement and statement by the authors that they have conducted the reported research in accordance with relevant institutional and national guidelines and regulations regarding experiments on human subjects, live vertebrates or higher invertebrates and the <u>ISSCR Guidelines for Stem Cell Research and Clinical Translation</u>. Abstracts reporting any experimental work that was not conducted in accordance with these guidelines will be rejected by the Program/Organizing Committee.

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The ISSCR is committed to ensuring that the public presentation of stem cell research and its applications are done responsibly to avoid misrepresentation of the work and misleading of the public (see Recommendation 4.1, ISSCR Guidelines for Stem Cell Research and Clinical Trials). This is especially important for sensitive areas of research including chimeras, embryo models, and some brain organoid work. For example, the ISSCR advises against using the term "synthetic embryo" to describe stem cell-based embryo models. Such embryo models should also be described as integrated or non-



integrated to ensure precise communication. To ensure that the science presented at ISSCR meetings is accurately represented, we may ask authors to revise the language used in their titles, abstracts or presentations.

The Program/Organizing Committee may solicit additional information from submitters to further evaluate compliance with the above policies. Failure to reply satisfactorily to a request for additional information constitutes grounds for abstract rejection.

3. Not Published Elsewhere

Abstracts must be based on results that have not been published in their entirety or have been recently published (6 months or less) in any journal nationally or internationally, before submission to ISSCR.

4. Identical Policy

Presentation material presented at the meeting must be substantively identical to that described in the abstract. In particular, the title, authorship, and scientific content of the presentation at the meeting must match that in the abstract.

5. Presentation Limits

An individual may appear as the presenting author on only one accepted oral abstract. No presentation may be given by an individual who is not an author on the abstract. An individual may present a maximum of one oral and three poster presentations during the meeting.

6. Author Consent

Authors may not be listed on an abstract unless they have given their consent to the submitting author. All material must be the work of the authors listed.

7. Full Disclosure of Information

Transparency is vital for the open sharing of information. The ISSCR requires full disclosure of the identities of genes, proteins, chemicals, active agents etc. in all presentations, both oral and poster.

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
